Term Two Classroom News D/1/2

We continue with our A Team: Pam Carlile, Gwenda McArdle and Gayle Messervy. Michelle Fleming will be working with us for a while on Thursdays for her TA training.

In **maths** we are exploring:

- Time
- Shapes
- Location
- Patterning
- Data (Prep only)
- Number
- Money
- Fractions (Year 1&2)
- Area (Year 2 only)
- Addition and subtraction (Year 1&2)

We are working on these topics through a problems solving lens and offering a concept called: Novel Problems. These are problems that the children will not have seen before. Learning in this way will require them to make links between the novel problem and other times they have solved other problems. 'How can I use what I have done at another time, to help me solve this problem?' Our **English** unit is all about characters. We will be exploring books that have a big focus on characters, especially those that have develop and change as the story goes on. These ideas will build on from ideas we explored in Term one when we discussed why we likes some stories more than others.

Jolly Phonics- it is anticipated that we will finish our first learning of all of the Jolly Phonics sounds this term. We will be moving into sounds that are made by more than 2 letters soon such as er and ai. These are usually more difficult for students to learn but so far, they are doing a great job!

Heggarty: This is a great Phonemic awareness program. It involves our students listening to words and recognising, removing, adding, manipulating sounds. It helps students to deepen their knowledge of sounds and sound patterns: Year 1 and prep work on this.

Spelling: Year 2 have already started on their formal spelling lists, this will continue. After the Jolly Phonics have been completed, our Preps and Year 1's will also be starting formal spelling lessons. It is anticipated that we will continue to mix our children across the school to ensure that they can work with a group of spellers who are at the same developmental stage. This should start in Week 2.

Handwriting: There are a lot of CRAZY habits that our students have developed with their handwriting. We will be working hard to reverse these. If your child is in Year 1 or 2, it is ok to correct the way that they form their letters. Preps have a little more wriggle room. Watch out for children writing the round letters such as o,a d,g in the wrong direction. Also watch out for students who start letters at the bottom instead of the top: I, h, t.

Reading: All children will participate in formal reading groups this year. The Preps have finished their Read it Again program for now and will right in the thick of it- how exciting!

Speaking: We will continue our Show and Tell this term. New topics will come home with our homework in Week 2 with Show and Tell starting in Week 3). This term a record will be kept of who participates and how they go against a set of criteria. Students do not have to participate every week, a goal of participating at least 5 times across the term is a great goal to have.

HASS

Mrs McArdle continues to teach our HASS unit which is a semester long. The topic is personal

Histories; identifying and describing important dates and changes in our own lives. Last newsletter I told you about my best Christmas that was in Helsinki. This time I will tell you that September 2nd is such an important date for me. That is when my granddaughter Stella was born. She has had a huge impact on my life. Fun Fact: On Sunday 16th April Stella had to be rescued as she had her head stuck through some railings on a play ground....

Mrs McArdle will be assessing this unit this term and will report on it in our Semester One report cards.



The Arts

Our music unit: Lets sing and Play Together is a semester long unit. Our students will continue to sing songs and play instruments with Mrs Summers. In class we are learning a song to sing and hopefully a dance to perform at the Mothers' Day luncheon at the hall in May. We will also be creating lanterns for ANZAC Day and a yet to be determined visual arts master piece for entry into both Dayboro Day and Woodford Show competitions.

Science

RIVETOE

This Term we are working on a unit of work called Living Adventure. We will be exploring how different places meet the needs of living things.

In addition we will be continuing our non-assessed Science experiments in class. The reason for the inclusion of our Thursday experiments is to develop a positive mindset towards Science, to teach about fair tests, to build knowledge in Science and teach Science based safety (We only broke one glass last term). My proudest moment last term was when a Year 1 student could tell me what a saturated solution was!



Health Respect

We will be working on the RESPECT Program. The theme of our learning is Friendship, inclusion and belonging. We will covering the concepts of:

- 1. Respect, care and kindness are qualities of good friendship.
- 2. Gender inclusive behaviours build respect and inclusion.

The Respect program, previously called the Respectful Relationships Education Program, was developed as part of the Queensland Government's commitment to address domestic and family violence. Consultation ensured the program could continue to empower young people to develop the skills they need to form respectful and ethical relationships, free of violence and gender inequality.
